

Gallery Walk

A gallery walk is an engaging and interactive classroom activity where students move around the room to examine a series of displays, which can include information, artifacts, images, documents, or student work. These displays are arranged at different stations throughout the classroom, and each station is designed to represent a specific concept, question, or topic related to the lesson. Students actively engage with the material by observing, analyzing, discussing, and responding to prompts as they move from station to station, either independently or in small groups. This dynamic approach transforms the classroom into an exploratory learning environment, fostering curiosity and critical thinking.
